

The Carpenter-Dent Drug Company opened its doors in 1875 in a wood frame building on the lot next to where this building stands now. This building was erected in 1881 and became the home of the Carpenter-Dent Drug Company from 1881 - 2011, it is the oldest building in our downtown & the Drug Company was truly an anchor.

The challenge and the incredible opportunity was how to not only restore the structure but how do we create another business that will have the same kind of impact on our downtown and community. We decided on a restaurant knowing that people are planning there "night out" or their travels usually on where to eat first, and knowing it will be a consistent draw into the downtown area. We were given a low interest loan from the Laura Goad Turner Charitable Foundation to purchase the building and awarded a grant from the same Foundation to complete the rehabilitation. The transformation has truly been amazing with the building now being outfitted with a commercial kitchen, elevator, restrooms and more. What an awesome journey it has been and we can't wait to do it again!

Funding was made possible by the Laura Goad Turner Charitable Foundation, who provided the low interest loan.




On September 1st a new restaurant, "1881 on Main" Opened in this building!

As part of the FY 2013 Certified Local Government grant, the Bardstown Historical Review Board and City of Bardstown developed a 20-minute informational video on historic preservation and historic zoning including the Main Street program. The video was produced by Andrew Lyon, a WKU journalism and broadcasting student, for his Capstone project and was narrated by Matthew Fogle of PLG-TV.
