

## DANVILLE, KENTUCKY ~ AUGUST 15-17<sup>TH</sup>

**P**reservation Kentucky and its partners present the first Civil War sites preservation conference in Kentucky since 1993, and the first in the region since 2001. This conference will be a regional educational forum for Civil War battlefields and Civil War sites, as well as other historic sites and museums, to learn best practices for preservation and interpretation of their significant history.

The conference includes two workshops that will focus on the interpretation of slavery and interpretation of Civil War sites. Additionally this conference will explore the role of African Americans in the Civil War, and examine opportunities for giving voice to African Americans who've been underrepresented and long too silent for their contributions.

A second forum will be devoted to battlefield preservation in the 21<sup>st</sup> century and the challenges and opportunities associated with the perpetual preservation of these important places. Discussion topics will explore issues relevant to the region and for those working to preserve and interpret Civil War sites.

Battlefields and Beyond will be held August 15-17<sup>th</sup> in Danville, Kentucky and

include tours of the Perryville battlefield and Camp Nelson. A downtown tour of Civil War era Danville as well as sessions and events held in Civil War era buildings will add to the experience of this conference.

### Workshops

**Tracing Workshop:** Learn of the national and regional involvement in slavery, debunking pervasive myths about the role of slavery of the North and South in the Civil War. Earn a deeper knowledge of the complex history and legacy of slavery and developing skills for sensitive, balanced interpretation of slavery for historic sites.

**Interpretation Workshop:** Learn best practices for accurate and documented interpretation and preservation of civil war sites and other cultural resources. Learn skills for creating interpretation that engages visitors and helps you achieve your mission and vision.

### Touring

**Perryville Battlefield:** The Battle of Perryville, also known as the Battle of Chaplin Hills, was fought on October 8, 1862, in the Chaplin Hills west of Perryville, Kentucky. The Battle of Perryville was one of the bloodiest battles of the Civil War and the largest battle fought in the state of Kentucky

**Camp Nelson:** Established in 1863 as a US army quartermaster depot for the Union army during the Civil War, Camp Nelson became a USCT recruiting and training ground for new soldiers from eastern Tennessee and escaped slaves, many of whom trained to be soldiers and eventually served as a refugee camp.

**Historic Danville:** Danville has been called the "Birthplace of the Bluegrass" since the signing of Kentucky's first Constitution in 1792. Home of the first Courthouse in Kentucky (1785), the first U.S. Post Office west of the 13 original colonies (1792), the first Capital of Kentucky (1785), and the first Political Club in the West (1786). Tour downtown and step back in time to experience this storied town and learn of its pivotal role during the Civil War.
