

**Great News for Winchester!**

The Winchester Board of Commissioners took a "limited step forward" in the process of restoring and repurposing a historic downtown building. Commissioners voted to move forward with the purchase of the Sphar Seed Company building, located at the intersection of North Main and Depot streets. Built in 1880, the three-story building is one of the oldest structures in downtown Winchester and one of the last structures standing on North Main Street with significant ties to the city's rail history.



In June, Gov. Steve Beshear announced \$1 million through the federal Transportation Enhancement (TE) program for the revitalization of the property into a community building which would house Winchester's Welcome Center and other potential projects.

When you bring together the idea of pop up (temporary) businesses with the tiny house movement, you get tiny business villages. They make great sense for small towns and rural places.

### **Garden Sheds Turned Incubator: Tionesta Market Village**

Tionesta, Pennsylvania, (population 500) had a lot that was vacant for 10 years after a fire in the downtown, reader Julia McCray told me when she was with [Forest County IDA/IDC](#). The Industrial Development Corporation bought the lot and created a micro-retail incubator. Julia said it's really a pop-up facilitator.

They started with standard outdoor sheds, then designed 1800s style false fronts for them. The buildings have no heat, so they are seasonal. The investment came to about \$40,000 with site work, furnishings and buildings. They are leased annually, so people can try their business idea with minimal investment (about \$500 start-up) and no long-term commitment. Rent is just \$50 – \$70 per month plus electric, and the tenants share the cost of collective advertising. They have had a waiting list for these buildings from the very beginning of the project!

“The goal was to create healthy traffic in the downtown that would help boost sales at our existing businesses, spur new businesses, encourage façade improvements, and attract a developer to the site,” Julia said. “It’s working! Our coffee shop and art gallery extended their hours and saw a boost in sales. A vacant building was purchased and is being renovated for mixed-use. We have a lot more traffic in our downtown, and that depressing vacant lot is now vibrant and attractive. The original intention of the project was that it be a temporary solution, but the community loves it! Artisans are selling their products; tourists are coming to see ‘the Village’; residents and seasonal residents are coming back to the downtown; a couple of the shops have hired part-time help. This project shows that “pop-ups” work and are good for a community!” Read more about it at [Tionesta Market Village](#).

## Litter Abatement Grants - Division of Waste Management accepting applications through November 2

The Energy and Environment Cabinet's (EEC) Division of Waste Management (DWM) is calling for applications for clean up grants.

"These grant programs provide much-needed funding to local governments," said EEC Secretary Len Peters. "The Litter Abatement Grant program is a very simple and efficient way to help the scenic cities and counties of the Commonwealth ensure that their roads remain litter-free," he added.

#### Litter Abatement Grants

Grant requests for litter cleanup will be accepted from counties in compliance with their five-year solid waste management plans and from incorporated cities which, by solid waste ordinance or other means, provide municipal solid waste collection service. The Litter Abatement Grant program is supported by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet's Road Fund and Highway Construction Contingency Fund.

Grant requests must be received by Lisa Evans at the Division of Waste Management no later than 4:30 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 2, 2015. The signed original agreement and any supporting documentation must be submitted in order for the request to be complete.

- The applying city or agency must be a current member of the Kentucky League of Cities Insurance Services (KLCIS) program with General Liability or Law Enforcement insurance coverage.
- **Only one application will be accepted from each insured member.**

#### Important Safety Grant Program Dates

- Application period: **September 15, 2015 – November 13, 2015, noon, EST.**
- Invoices or purchase orders must be attached to the grant and returned at the same time.
- We will accept purchase orders and invoices dated July 1, 2015 to November 13, 2015.
- Due to the popularity of this grant, we advise members to apply early. If safety grant applications exceed funds available, **grants will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis.**
- We recommend emailing or faxing the application. Processing of the mailed application is based on the date we receive the application.


#### Application Rules

- **The Safety Grant is a 50/50 matching grant.**
  - o Liability:
    - Members with General Liability, Law Enforcement and/or Property coverage with total premiums less than \$35,000 are eligible for up to \$1,500 grant reimbursements for approved purchases.
    - Members with General Liability, Law Enforcement and/or Property coverage with total premiums \$35,000 and above are eligible for up to \$3,000 grant reimbursements for approved purchases.
