Dasjon Jordan is an organizer, designer, and planner from New Orleans. He has worked with public agencies, cities, community-based organizations and the private sector on place-based economic development strategies in the U.S., South Africa and Mexico. Dasjon specializes in commercial district revitalization focusing on small business financial and marketing ecosystems, restorative design strategies, and neighborhood cultural planning.

Prior to returning to BCC, Dasjon was the Strategy and Development Officer for the Ujamaa Economic Development Corporation. Also, Dasjon was a Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) CoLab (Community Innovators Lab) post-graduate fellow. His work focused on growing the Department of Urban Studies and Planning at MIT, student engagement in racial and economic justice in practice and pedagogy through CoLab. Dasjon returns to lead BCC, after working as the Commercial Revitalization Coordinator at Broad Community Connections in 2016. He holds a master's of city planning from MIT and a bachelor's of architecture from Louisiana State University.

Dasjon believes in people and trusting relationships to forge civic power and make things happen. BCC's future with Dasjon is rooted in relationships and driven by bold imagination.

Peer-Led Strategies for Rural Redevelopment" Learn how two different community Main Street programs became leaders in redevelopment. Join Tracy Robinson of Guthrie and Deana Wright of Murray who each have over 20 years as Main Street directors as they share their experience in the field of property development and tax credits.



Learning from your peers in the field of property redevelopment in rural communities can be invaluable, as these environments often require creative, locally informed solutions that differ from urban models. Peers who have navigated zoning challenges, secured funding through grants or public-private partnerships, or engaged effectively with local stakeholders can offer practical insights online resources can't provide.



By sharing successes and setbacks, peer developers help each other avoid common pitfalls, discover cost-effective materials or methods, and better understand the cultural and economic dynamics unique to rural areas.

This exchange of experience fosters a collaborative approach to revitalizing communities while preserving their character and addressing local needs.



From Flooding to Flourishing In an era where communities face increasing risks from natural and human-made disasters, proactive planning and local leadership have never been more critical. Teresa Mays brings a wealth of experience in community development and resilience-building, offering a grounded perspective on how small towns can prepare for, respond to, and recover from crises.

This session will focus on disaster resilience and revitalization strategies for small towns and rural Main Streets. In Beattyville repeated flooding devastated downtown businesses and historic buildings yet sparked innovative projects and partnerships that positioned the community for long-term growth.

Teresa will highlight how resilience planning is not just about physical infrastructure, but also about strengthening the economic, cultural, and social fabric of Main Street.
