Grants Now Available: Telling the Full History Preservation Fund

The <u>Telling the Full History grant program</u> provides \$25,000 and \$50,000 grants for humanities-based work to interpret and preserve historic places of importance to underrepresented communities including, but not limited to, women, immigrants, Asian Americans, Black Americans, Latinx Americans, Native Americans, Native Hawai-

This grant program is made possible through the National Endowment for the Humanities' American Rescue Plan Humanities Grantmaking for Organizations and administered by The National Trust for Historic Preservation. Along with the grant funding, National Trust staff will provide technical assistance to grantees.

Applications will be accepted from:

- 501(c)(3) nonprofit humanities-based organizations
- Accredited public and 501(c)(3) colleges and universities
- state, local and Tribal governmental agencies
