




Mayor Scott Jackson, the city, Teresa Mays & the Main Street team, Dedra Brandenburg with tourism, and so many others have worked tirelessly to reimagine the downtown. And more great things are coming! This time next year it will have a town square and more! We can't wait!

Two Main Street businesses were awarded start up grants at the opening. One will be a fishing/bait/kayak shop and one is a new bakery!!



The City of Covington is offering to help renovate small business exteriors and pay startups' rent as part of it's Small Business Program!

The program offers up to \$500 a month for first-year rent for 12 months, or a forgivable loan of up to \$6,000 to match dollar-for-dollar investments in façade improvements to a commercial building, such as for paint, lighting or windows.

With the March 25 deadline only days away, businesses should apply soon!

The City set aside \$150,000 this fiscal year for the program and has \$95,665 available to be awarded by June 30

A side note from KYMS these projects could possibly also be eligible for historic preservation tax credits.

#### Coming to downtown Paducah!

Milestones are being met in the City Block project! The developer, Weyland Ventures, has received an official notice from Paducah Bank of a commitment of the financing portion of the Paducah Downtown Boutique Hotel which will be along Jefferson Street. The City and Weyland Ventures have completed the requirements in the development agreement signed by both parties in 2020. Expect groundbreaking later this spring.
