Did you know that the Main Street program began at the National Trust for Historic Preservation? It was created to address the decline in small downtowns across the country most of which were rural. We continue that work today.

In 2021 our communities contributed over \$60,000,000 to the Commonwealth. 130 net new businesses were opened and 587 net new jobs were created, even in a pandemic!

We remain a grassroots organization who work to make downtowns vibrant places that enhance the quality of life through preservation, promotion, and participation. Main Street is economic development based in historic preservation (good buildings bring

good businesses) and we strive to build upon the cultural assets of a community to offer authentic experiences to visitors and locals alike.


