

We are sure by now that you realize Main Street is more than a name. It is more than a Kentucky thing, and it can be so much more than most people know. Most of you have likely seen the show Hometown on HGTV with its hosts, Erin and Ben Napier. They are actual residents and business owners in the Main Street community of Laurel, Mississippi. Laurel, Mississippi is not that much different than many of your communities. The population might be larger, but the commitment and love for the town is just the same. Here is a little from Ed McMahon to explain more about the Power of Place and how a committed group of individuals can make a difference.

More than ten years after Laurel Main Street became a designated Main Street program, the city of 18,000 is now a thriving downtown full of mom-and-pop shops, eateries, and small-town charm. Laurel's story of success exemplifies the power of the Main Street movement and the impact of place-based economic development. As MSA's Chair Emeritus and Senior Resident Fellow at the Urban Land Institute Ed McMahon explains, "Laurel's story resonates with viewers — in large part because it showcases the power of place and the ability of a committed group of people to make a difference."In his most recent article, Ed McMahon explores the important role the Main Street Approach has played in Laurel and other towns across Mississippi, and makes the case for investing in small, local development efforts instead of chasing large development projects.
