May 14-16 KYMS attended the Rural Rise summit in Davis, WVA. A wide range of individuals and organizations shared their visions and their work in rural communities and several opportunities were presented. Organizations/business such as AARP, ARC, Colleges/Universities, Etsy, Foundations, MSA, NACCE, USDA and many others. There were 170 participants, 90 resources shared and 1200+ insights.

- Did you know that of the 1.9 million active sellers on ETSY, 87% of the are women. 28% live in rural areas. This is a great audience to have at a pop-up event. Invite your local ETSY sellers. 99.9 of all us counties have ETSY sellers!
- Knoxville has branded itself as the Maker City and Memphis has mapped their makers. (Did you know we have a few directors who are makers?)
- USDA has dollars for broadband. Fundamental services, access to internet affects health outcomes (useful words in grants), 30% of rural communities do not have access which affects business development along with other issues. You can partner with USDA through farm bureau. The SBA is also working with USDA
- Rural Development Innovation Center—new website for best practices and innovations
- 42% of Appalachia is rural compared to 22% of the rest of the US, 54 KY counties are considered to be in Appalachia.
- Did you know culture is the primary driver of economic development
- The communities that will thrive in the new economy are those that best help people make ideas happen.
- KCTCS have entrepreneurship classes. Maysville is one of the leaders in this area.
- Keys to Rural Business Opportunity 1. Brand your destination
 2.Creating an Entrepreneurial Environment 3. Sense of Place (sounds like Main Street to us)



Bring your Lounge Chair; wear your dancing nees and come on down to Bill Woods Park for a night of great music and fun.







Middlesboro Main Street (formerly Discover Downtown Middlesboro) held an Artists Reveal lunch at the Bell County Tourism office for all of the sponsors to attend.

The sponsors were treated to a brief history of the Levitt series in Middlesboro by Bo Hoe,
