"Landskating" takes us to Barcelona, where marginalized urban spaces are reclaimed and redeveloped as skate parks. See how this small-scale project brings joy and community to the neighborhoods.

Then we go to China in "Shanghai Transitions" which presents the other end of the spectrum. In this short film, tour Shanghai neighborhoods with local Dutch architects as they reflect on the impact of extreme, intense, rapid development.








COVINGTON: Work continues inside and out on the renovation of 535 Madison Ave., aka the Republic Bank Building. Four of the six floors in the 27,000 square-foot building have been mostly vacant for 10 to 15 years. The development team called The Covington Republic LLC (consisting of Sparen Real Estate, Manning Construction, and Work Architecture + Design) bought the building and is turning the inside into Class A office space, expanding its elevator, enhancing its historic façade, and adding a rooftop bar and restaurant space.
