Narrative Description

Summary Paragraph

Shopville Elementary School (PU 1261) is a sprawling consolidated school constructed in 1959 and located at 10 Shopville Road, in Somerset, Kentucky (Figure 1). Although the school's address is located in Somerset, it derives its name from and is more accurately located in Shopville, Kentucky, a small unincorporated community situated roughly 9 miles northeast of Somerset. The school is located on the north side of Hal Rogers Parkway (Kentucky Highway 80) on a small local road, Shopville Road, and just east of the intersection of Hal Rogers Parkway and Highway 461, both important thoroughfares to the area. The property includes just over 22 acres, consisting of two parcels, both of which have historically and presently been associated with the school and related activities. Included within the same parcel as the school is the Shopville Park Gym (PU 338), a historic resource situated just east of the main building that predates the consolidated school. The resource is bounded by Shopville Road and Vaught Lane to the south, Mark Shopville Road and neighboring parcels to the west, Flat Lick Creek to the north, and the neighboring parcel to the east. The Period of Significance stretches from 1959, the year the building was constructed, through 1975, the last year included in the Multiple Property Listing *Historic Public Schools in Kentucky*. The building is in good condition and retains sufficient integrity for listing.

Character of Site

Shopville Elementary School is just east of one of the area's busiest road junctions and roughly 9 miles northeast of Somerset, the Pulaski County seat and largest city. The school is within the unincorporated community of Shopville, which is itself within Somerset. The school is located in a predominantly rural area, compared to nearby Somerset, and is surrounded by undeveloped land, small residential developments, and scattered single-family dwellings. There is also a somewhat large commercial and industrial presence nearby, due to its location at the intersection of Hal Rogers Parkway and 461. The area directly around the school is a combination of residential and open undeveloped land with the Flat Lick Creek meandering just north of the property. The west side of the building has a large parking lot while there is a roadway directly to the south and north that allows access to all areas of the school. There is a single associated building, the Shopville Park Gym, that appears to be accessible to the community, that is Contributing and located on the same property, just east of the school. To the east of the gym, there is another parking lot. There are playground spaces to the northwest of the school and a large unused grass swath north of the access roads, in between the school and the creek. The building itself is separated into three different sections, the main entryway on the south elevation, the main east west corridor in the middle of the building, and the auxiliary areas of the school on the north elevation.




Figure 2. Boundary of the Eubank Elementary School NR Listing, as shown on the USGS 7.5-Minute Eubank, KY Map (USGS 1952).

Exterior

The building includes a one-story central block with a rear ell connected to this central portion. The south façade includes a covered entryway constructed of a concrete foundation, brick veneer exterior siding, and a flat roof with simple pediment (Photos 1 through 3). Within the pediment is a concrete sign that reads “Shopville” (Photo 4). The covered entryway is supported by five square brick columns with stone veneer bases. The rest of this portion of the building has a poured concrete foundation, a mix of brick exterior cladding and sectioned concrete walls, with a flat roof.

The brick exterior of the north façade is a brick veneer with courses of soldier facing bricks at the base of the concrete portions of the exterior (Photo 5). The concrete paneled sections are around one-over-one replacement vinyl windows and have six concrete panels each to create a sectional break in the concrete visual and are connected to a concrete sill. The exterior is separated by square brick columns that connect to a large overhang. The wings of the building have only brick veneer cladding and do not have the concrete panel covering in the center portion of the south façade (Photo 6).

The north elevation of the original portion of the building matches the south facade with a concrete foundation and a combination of brick and concrete side with one-over-one replacement vinyl windows (Photo 7). In addition to this, there are glass block windows along the upper portion of the wall (Photo 8). Also on the north elevation is the rear ell with the attached gymnasium (Photo 9).

This rear ell is constructed of a concrete foundation, brick veneer exterior cladding, and a combination of a flat roof and a gable front roof on the gymnasium. Windows on the rear ell include fixed two pane windows that are replacements to the building's original construction. In the middle of the south elevation's ell is a covered entryway set into the elevation with a concrete staircase. There is a concrete courtyard between the school and the rear ell (Photo 10). The east and west elevations each are covered with a brick veneer (Photo 11).

Interior

The general makeup of the building's interior is constructed with a central corridor through the length of the building east to west with an intersection near its center running north to south. The main entrance is located on the south elevation and is constructed in a diamond shape with the office and administrative spaces off the main entrance. The flooring of this space is covered with two colored vinyl tiles in a diamond pattern, concrete block walls, and a dropped ceiling (Photo 12). The office spaces have carpet flooring with concrete block walls and a dropped ceiling.

The main interior portion of the building consists of 24 classrooms, mechanical spaces, and two restroom facilities. The hallways of the building are made of vinyl tile styled after terrazzo with a black border, concrete block wall, and a dropped ceiling (Photo 13). The shorter hallway running north south has in addition to this a brick wall along one side and a concrete block wall on the other. The classrooms are also constructed of vinyl tile flooring, concrete block walls, and a drop ceiling (Photo 14). The restrooms of the school are constructed with concrete flooring, concrete block walls, and a drop ceiling (Photo 15).

The auxiliary portion off the north elevation includes the Media Center, teachers' lounge, computer lab, the gymnasium, and cafeteria. The Media Room includes the main area with rooms connected directly to the main room and includes office space. The main room is made up of carpet, concrete block walls, and a drop ceiling (Photo 16). The attached office space has windows that looks into the main Media Room space with the same carpet flooring, modern drywall walls, and a drop ceiling. A storage room is directly off the cafeteria and has vinyl tile flooring, concrete block walls, and a drop ceiling. The Teacher's Lounge is also located off the cafeteria and is separated by a computer lab. The computer lab has vinyl tile flooring, faux wood paneled walls, and a dropped ceiling (Photo 17). The cafeteria has the same material make-up as well with vinyl tile flooring, concrete block walls, and a drop ceiling (Photo 18). The gym is a large space with polished concrete floors, concrete block walls, and exposed metal rafters (Photo 19). Overall, the building has a cohesive use of materials throughout the entire building including its many additions, indicating that during various renovations, materials were replaced to keep everything cohesive.

The school retains integrity of location, setting, feeling, and association as a functioning school building that has been used as a school over the course of its history. The various additions and renovations done to the school ensure that its history and function as such can continue. The school does lack the aspects of material and design from the various additions and renovations; however, this does not detract from the building's overall integrity possessed within the other aspects of integrity.

Shopville Park Gym

Located just east of the Shopville Elementary School is the Shopville Park Gym, a historic gym that predates the school. The Shopville Park Gym was once associated with earlier educational facilities in the same area that were demolished to make way for the new elementary school. The Shopville Park Gym was constructed ca. 1930, around the same time as the previous school, and features a poured concrete foundation, exterior walls of concrete block and brick construction, and a vaulted roof clad in standing seam metal roofing. There is a short, one-story, shed-roof projection from the south (main) façade that features two sets of metal double doors, serving as the building's primary entryway. There is a similar shed-roof projection off the rear of the building. The building, as a whole, is relatively unadorned, with the exception of the signage, centered in the south façade, just under the vaulted end, and five simplistic concrete block pilasters on each of the east and west facades. The interior of the gym is simplistic in its design with the main portion, the vaulted section of the building, consisting of a full basketball court and the two projections housing associated areas, such as bathrooms, a kitchenette, and storage/maintenance rooms.

Changes to the Property Since the Period of Significance

Shopville Elementary School was constructed in 1959, but the neighboring gym, that is now associated with the school, was built in the decades before the school, likely for a previous school that was once located at a similar location. Previous documentation states that the detached gym was constructed ca. 1930 for another associated school from the same time that was demolished and replaced with the current school. The Shopville Elementary School has been expanded through additions and minor changes to the interior, consistent with a school that has been in continuous use for nearly seventy years. Some of the interior changes, which are necessary to the ongoing use as a functional and safe school, include classroom door hardware replacement, access control, video intercom system installations, and the installation and consistent upgrades of a video system.¹ The school has undergone five additions throughout its existence, the first two being within the Period of Significance (1963 and 1975) and the latter three occurring in the end of the twentieth century and the beginning of the twenty first.

The school has maintained its use as a public school for all the years since its original construction. The various additions and renovations made to the school were done to ensure that it could continue to function as a school. The original portion of the building's exterior that is visible includes the central block with the brick exterior. The main entryway on the southern façade is a modern addition, but it is consistent with the overall function and identity of the building, and closely matches similar schools in the county that were built during the same period. The northern extension was an early addition to the building and is still largely intact, with some additions of its own. The sectioned concrete walled areas with windows could be original to the building; however, it is possible that these spaces were once large window sets that have been walled off with smaller windows added. Documentary evidence has not been found to reveal whether the concrete is original. The east and west elevations of the building are also not original as they were constructed after 1975. Despite the material changes to the building, the building still retains sufficient integrity and meets the Registration Requirements set forth in the Historic Public Schools of Kentucky MPD.

Statement of Significance

Summary Paragraph

The Shopville Elementary School (PU 1261 and PU 338) is locally significant within the historic context, Public Schools in Kentucky 1800-1975, as outlined in the Historic Public Schools of Kentucky MPD, and is a significant instance of the property type Post-War School Buildings. The school's significance is rooted in the ongoing consolidation movement, which resulted in the construction of modern educational facilities throughout Kentucky to cater to a wider geographic region and provide better educational accommodations for the schoolchildren, and how that movement positively impacted rural communities. Schools, such as Shopville Elementary School, were essential for Kentucky's rural and suburban areas, as they provided adequate educational facilities, established with progressive ideologies best suited for learning, that could grow and evolve as needs arose

Shopville Elementary School meets the Registration Requirements set forth in the Multiple Property Listing. The Post-War School Buildings Property Type includes buildings that were a part of the ongoing consolidation movement of the mid-20th century. These buildings are characterized by the prevalent architectural and educational ideologies of the time, those that were designed to best foster learning for Kentucky's schoolchildren. These buildings' ability to evolve and grow in order to accommodate ongoing needs was paramount. As such, buildings, such as Shopville Elementary School, were frequently altered and additions were added. These additions and alterations that occur after 1975 are weighed against the significance of the building, to determine whether the building's significant identity survives in material form. The important question an eligible property must answer in the affirmative is whether the building's physical status today continues to reinforce the significance of local historical educational efforts.

Similar to other rural counties in Kentucky, the educational landscape following World War II drastically changed. This was in large part due to the changing demographics of the area with the return of veterans and the subsequent baby boomer population, as well as the constant improvement of the Commonwealth's infrastructure, coupled with the increasing availability of automobiles for Americans. Of the eight elementary schools currently serving Pulaski County, which in this case refers to public schools offering preschool through fifth grade classes, five were constructed within the Period of Significance of the Multiple Property Listing *Historic Public Schools of Kentucky*. These elementary schools were built between 1951-1963, with the earliest of these new, consolidated schools, aligning with the year in which the earliest baby boomers entered preschool. By the time the last of the first four consolidated schools were constructed, in 1963, all small rural one and two-room public schools in Pulaski County had been phased out and closed. Since 1987, there have been three new public elementary schools built in Pulaski County as determined by the growing population, with the last being built in 2009.

History of Nominated Property

Shopville Elementary School was constructed in 1959. The school consolidation movement began around the turn of the century, but in many of Kentucky's counties, it was not until after WWII that diligent efforts were made to implement the changes both in physical school construction and ideological evolution of the curriculums and the importance placed on new offerings. Elementary School was tied for third, with Nancy Elementary, of the new consolidated schools built in Pulaski County between 1951-1963, after Burnside Elementary and Eubank Elementary, all of which cover a different geographic region of the county.

The gym, which is located just east of the school, was standing in its present location prior to the construction of the school. Based on earlier topographic maps and documentation, the gym was from around 1930 and was associated with an older school building that was demolished and replaced with the current resource. It is considered a Contributing resource to this nomination because it has served the school and community since 1959 and has been directly related to the educational and communal offerings. Moreover, the gym is considered a significant education-related facility per the MPD.

When the school was originally constructed, it consisted of a simple rectangular design with the small extension off the north façade, housing the cafeteria and kitchen. The school was designed in the sprawling contemporary education-focused style that was dominating educational architectural ideology of the time. The original school was a simple one-story, rectangular building with windows, allowing for adequate lighting, and most importantly, designed in a way to allow for ease of growth as needs arose. The building lacked ornamentation and focused much more on the utilitarian nature that was deemed appropriate for new schools. Over the first four decades, there were a series of additions that expanded the school to the west, north, and east, including the addition of more classrooms, to meet ongoing educational needs, and the addition of a gymnasium off the west to offer more recreational opportunities for the local community, bringing the school more in line with modern educational facilities. The latest addition was an administrative area off the south façade, something that has become more common in schools as needs and regional and population requirements dictate. This frequent, and relatively easy and seamless series of additions is emblematic of the significance of the new county consolidated schools, as they were designed with that precise purpose in mind. As opposed to the larger schools of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries that focused on grandeur and portraying a sense of high-style academia, the new schools recognized that the largest downfall to those earlier schoolhouses was their inability to adapt to the growing and often unpredictable nature of the required evolution. The new school designs sought to remedy that by utilizing simple forms, simple materials, and consistent designs on a sprawling building that allowed for additions to be easily added onto the outer wings and, less commonly, the rear of the building.

Since the Period of Significance, additions have been added to the building, elongating it and expanding the footprint on all four sides. There have also been additions as well as the construction of ancillary buildings to the rear, in addition to recreational fields and structures including playgrounds, storage buildings, and a larger parking lot.

Throughout its existence, the Shopville Elementary School has been designed and constructed architecturally to meet the contemporary requirements of public education and has grown to accommodate growing populations and increased needs. It has remained a valuable resource in Kentucky public school education and a testament to the mid-twentieth century ideologies ensuring that the design of schools could adapt with growing needs, provide an ideal learning environment for students, and be easily accessible by all students in the surrounding district.

Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary of the Shopville Elementary School includes the entirety of two legal parcels on which the school is located. The property is roughly bounded by Shopville Road and Vaught Lane to the south, Mark Shopville Road and neighboring parcels to the west, Flat Lick Creek to the north, and neighboring parcels to the east. The southwest corner of the property begins at the northwest corner of the intersection of Vaught Lane and Mark Shopville Road and continues north to Flat Lick Creek, then follows the south side of the creek to the point where it runs into the parcel of the Shopville Public Library, and then continues south the that property's intersection with Shopville Road and then west to the point of the beginning.

Boundary Justification (Explain why the boundaries were selected.)

The boundary of the Shopville Elementary School NR Listing is identical to the legal descriptions of the two parcels on which the school and gym sit, according to the Pulaski County, Kentucky PVA. This is the boundary as it is the parcel that has been historically associated with the school.


